

AFA Homeschool Program





Day of Remembrance



German Cherusci Tribe, Segimer in 16 BCE. Segimer was a Roman sympathizer and both of his sons, Hermann and Flavus, were raised in the Roman empire under Roman "guardianship". Hermann proved to be equal to the task and it did not take him long to excel as a soldier in the Roman Legions. He earned both roman citizenship and the rank of a Roman Knight before distinguishing himself in His exploits in the Great Illyrian Revolt, after which he was sent to Germania to aid in finishing the conquest of the Germanic Tribes.

Once in Germania again, Hermann was able to quietly unite five Germanic tribes with the intention of overthrowing the Roman occupation of his land. His deep knowledge of Roman warfare and his sharp tactical mind lead to the historic Battle of Teutoburg Forest, and Rome's most devastating defeat. Despite backlash from his Roman sympathizing father and brother and the loss of his wife and then-unborn son, Hermann continued to fight against the Romans and their retaliatory attacks.

Ultimately, Hermann was assassinated by tribal leaders who were frightened of his great power, in 21 CE. Even so, it was his crucial victory in the Teutoburg Forest that forever changed the face of Germania and the Roman empire.

So, what can we learn from this story?

We no longer have the ancestral homeland to fight for as our ancestors did. We live too scattered and the countries of our ancestors are not what they once were. However, we still have families, we have ideals and we have Asatru. Every day is a battle to hang onto those ideals that no longer have a proper place in our modern society. Every day is a battle to make our world a little better, a little stronger for those who we leave behind when we die. Patience and fortitude will get us far. So will the knowledge of how to best fight for what we want. With the knowledge of how to do things the right way, it might take that one decisive victory to reshape the future of our Folk.

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Winter Finding



Winter Finding is sort of the winter prequel of feasts. This feast happens on the Fall Equinox and is the second harvest feast of the year (the first is Freyfaxi in August). Winter Finding is the beginning of autumn complete with foods harvested from around this time. Traditionally, it was a celebration of putting up crops for the winter and preparing for the cold winter months ahead. This was the time when people prepared to stay indoors, farmers moved their primary livestock inside or into their barns, and extraneous animals were slaughtered and preserved for winter.

Winter Finding was often celebrated with bonfires, feasting, dancing, and blots. In preindustrial times, this was a crucial period because if the harvest was poor, it meant possible death by starvation in the winter months.

food available, provided we have money.

That being said, it helps to have a farmer's market in your area (or better yet, have a backyard garden of your own) because you will get a better feel for the season and the types of food being produced in your area. Eating a feast made with foods from that season is a sure way to connect with our ancestors and the types of foods they ate. Although many foods we eat nowadays weren't available to our Northern ancestors, due to the fact that a number of fruits and vegetables we eat come from the Western Hemisphere, eating seasonal foods puts us in touch with the seasons and the wights.

So, how do you stay in tune with the season? Check out these ideas and see if any resonate.

- Weather and fire laws permitting, have a bonfire (or light some wood in your fire pit).
- Create a Heathen feast with foods from local farmers that are in season.
- Spend time gathering wild edibles just be sure you know what you have.
- Preserve food for the winter: canning, dehydrating, and freezing.
- Make sure your pets and/or livestock are ready for the winter. Vaccinations, nail, and hoof trim, warm bedding, enough food, etc.
- Offer a blot to the gods of the harvest: Freyr, Gerðr, Freyja, Thor, Sif, and others.
- Start making your mead for Yule.
- Make sure your hunting gear is ready to go for hunting season.
- Get your house clean for winter.



What are birthing affirmation cards? They are cards that have images and words specific to each rune stave, drawing on the energy of each one but geared towards labor, delivery, and motherhood. These can be hung up or arranged around your labor and



Ancestral Food and Culture

Piparkokur (Icelandic Pepper Cookies)



I recently made these for a Moot and people enjoyed the unique spice taste of the cookies. Traditionally they are cut with a 2" round cookie cutter, but I had some cookie cutters that were gifted to me by my husband that I wanted to try. Keep in mind while making them that it is a soft dough and will spread while baking.

Piparkokur (Icelandic Pepper Cookies)

1 cup butter (room temperature)

1 cup sugar

³/₄ cup light corn syrup (or golden syrup)

- 3 ½ cups flour
- 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper
 - 1. Cream the butter and sugar together in a large bowl with an electric mixer, or vigorously by hand, then mix in the syrup and eggs and beat well.
 - 2. Sift in the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and spices ad mix until combined. Wrap dough and refrigerate overnight.
 - 3. Preheat the oven to 350 F and line two baking sheets with baking paper.
 - 4. Roll the dough out on a lightly floured surface to about ¼ inch thickness. This is quite a soft dough, but if it's not manageable to roll and cut, then lightly knead in a little more flour.
 - 5. Cut into rounds with a 2" cookie cutter and place onto the prepared baking sheet, an inch apart. Keep in mind that they will spread.
 - 6. Bake for 7 min. Let cool on the tray for a couple of minutes, then transfer to a wire rack to cool. They will firm as they cool.


Bread Horse



The recipe which I have found most effective for making large bread animals for blessings and feasts is actually a biscuit recipe. This is better than yeast bread because the dough does not swell up so much while rising, and thus there is less distortion of the animal's shape and so more detail is possible.


2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 4 teaspoons baking powder ½ teaspoon salt ¼ teaspoon cream of tartar 2 teaspoons sugar ½ cup butter 2/3 cup milk Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, cream of tartar, and sugar; cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk; stir until dough follows fork around bowl. Turn out on a lightly floured surface and shape into your beast.

The less kneading the dough gets, the lighter and flakier the end product will be. Bake in preheated oven at 350 degrees Fahrenheit until brown. If you are making a boar, a "bristled" effect can be achieved by making short snips along its back and side with a pair of clean scissors. The same technique can be used for texturing a horse's mane. A raisin or nut can be stuck into the dough to make the animal's eye.

Njörðshof

Njörðshof Dedication



August saw the culmination of all the hard work by our Folk with the dedication of Njörðshof, in White Springs, Florida. We welcomed our Alsherjargothi Matt Flavel, Witan Clifford Erickson, and his wife Gythia Catie Erickson to the new Njörðshof District. Along with members from across the country, there were 76 in attendance to witness this historic occasion. As our Alsherjargothi has stated, when Njörðr looked out and saw the first temple to him in over a thousand years, he saw the faces of those in attendance that day.



Friday brought the first of our members arriving from other states for the celebration of our divine ship captain, blood-priest, and oath-keeper. Everyone was in agreement upon seeing the mural that pictures can not do it justice. Witan Svan Herul has captured the joy of Njörðr in his smile, the wisdom in his eyes, and his bounty that surrounds him on three expansive panels. In the days leading up to dedication, I would swear the gold in the sonnenrad grew brighter.



After a tour of the hof and its property we enjoyed a delicious dinner from our magnificent cooks; Mike Joyner, his wife Katie, Pam McCloskey, Kayleigh Watkins, Gythia Anna Plourde, and Madison East. Every meal would be delicious and served with the biggest smiles!



The day closed with a Leadership Sumbel. As each who raised their horn to Njörðr under his watchful gaze, the circle was charged with his might. More ancient than even Freyr, one of the oldest of our Gods, he would in modern times know a temple in his name resides in Midgard.



As we were about to step outside to begin the Landtaking on Saturday, the clouds opened up and a downpour diverted us to the sanctuary, where we greeted the Gods and those in attendance. At the end, the hammer that has been used for ritual in Florida was turned over to the Alsherjargothi to be used in Njörðshof. By the time we were done, Þórr had cleansed the land and the skies cleared for the Landtaking.











Walking the grounds, led by our Alsherjargothi, each of our Gothar blessed the building and the land, taking them in the name of Njörðr and the Asatru Folk Assembly from this day forward. Returning to the doors we took note of the flags flying at the entrance to the hof; the flags of the AFA and the American Crow Kindred that have flown at every event in Florida for almost three years.



Removing the kindred flag the members replaced it with the flag of Njörðshof.

followed was powerful. Each ritual act of the day builds to this moment. The significance of what was taking place could be seen in the face of all those in attendance. The time being spanned from when last men had temples to our lord of the sea to this day seemed both wide and yet adjacent spiritually as we entered into the gifting cycle with Njörðr in a manner no one has for a thousand years. The souls fortunate enough to receive the first blessing in that holy place will look back on it as a milestone in their lives.



Lunch was our next culinary milestone, and we were treated to handmade sausages. The Leadership Panel had good thought-provoking questions and insightful answers. When the discussion was finished a twenty-dollar bill, that had been found in an offering bowl the day we picked up the keys for the hof, was presented to the Witan as the first token of prosperity from the hof.



Resuming the ceremonies, to my surprise, I was called to the vey. It was such an honor to take my oath as a Gothi for the Asatru Folk Assembly. The kind words of

Witan has placed in me to serve every member of our church so long as there is breath in my lungs.



But I was not the only one in for a surprise that day. Jesse Parton was next to take his oath as a Folkbuilder. His efforts over the past year and his passion for his faith and his folk have been clear to all, and it was a pleasure to witness it rewarded.



Gothi Trent East officiated the baby naming of little Violetta Meyers, bringing another soul into the clan.



Last, but certainly not least, Pam McCloskey took her oath to the American Crow Kindred. The success in Florida would not have been possible without her. Even before she joined the AFA, she was there bringing treats for the hungry Asatruar.

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Freyfaxi at Njörðshof




Here is just a brief morsel of food for thought on the recent holiday we typically call Freyfaxi today. We know that in ancient times there were harvest festivals around this time of year. Freyr being one of the wanes with agricultural functions, he was naturally expected to be venerated and there are records of horse fights as part of the celebrations. In the saga of Hrafnkel Freysgodi there is a horse called Freyfaxi who was dedicated to Frey, and it was forbidden that he be ridden or used for toil, much like the horses described by Tacitus in his first-century treatise on Germania. It is after this special horse that we name the harvest festival, but let us not forget that most of our culture is not as lost as we often believe, many customs and traditions quietly lived on right up until now, and shall continue to do so. I am not a scholar, but I like studying, and etymologies fascinate me. I wonder if the harvest rune (proto-Germanic *jera O.N. A'r) is the first part of the modern English "harvest" and if the "vest" element comes from the same root as O.N. "veizla" or festival/celebration (vest=fest).

One thing we had at Njordshof this year was an excessive amount of food and success; it can be said that we did yield a bountiful harvest.



This is my home altar. It incorporates a statute of Odin and Frigga, photos of mine and my wife's ancestors, some items used in past blots, and photos I have received from Asatru brothers that are/have been incarcerated.

The Lay of Rig - Proof that Odin Loves Us and Wants Us to Evolve Spiritually



I know what I am about to say is heresy, but Rig is Odin. The standard response is that Rig is Heimdall, but our lore would disagree with this. Heimdall was best known as the guardian of the Bifrost Bridge. If he is wandering around, then who is guarding the Bifrost Bridge? He wasn't known to be a great wanderer that assumed a disguise and an alternative name, whereas, Odin was a wanderer/traveler that assumed many disguises and was known by many names.

Heimdall wasn't known to impart his essence to our folk, whereas Odin, Villi, and Ve imparted their essence to create/evolve us. Odin made many sacrifices to protect/aid his folk. When I say "folk", I mean all that Odin considers his family which includes us, the gods/goddesses and the giants that are accepted into Aesir. He sacrificed his eye to

giantess might not have been a sacrifice.) He takes human form to disguise himself to interact with his folk in Midgard. I say "interact" because from where he sits he can see everything (the same seat that Freyr first observed Gerd), and Hugin and Mugin bring him information from Midgard. If he can see/know everything, then the only reason to travel/wander Midgard is to interact with his folk. This is the same reason that Freyr, after seeing Gerd from Odin's seat, sent his emissary to "interact" with Gerd. Odin would don a disguise to interact with a ruler that wasn't a good host. Odin suffered from the heat of a fire to cause the ruler to fall on his own sword, thereby transferring rulership to the ruler's son that was kind to Odin. If Odin would travel and suffer for this reason, then he would definitely travel to eat a meal and spend three nights with his folk.

Heimdall wasn't known to be associated with the runes. The runes were not something that the gods/goddesses automatically knew. Odin acquired the runes by hanging for nine nights, wounded by his own spear, with no food or drink, a sacrifice to himself. Odin taught Freya the runes and she taught him Seidr. In the Lay of Rig, Earl and Kon are taught the runes by Rig. Our lore would suggest that the teacher of the runes would have been Odin.

I would argue that the different households and people have nothing to do with the caste system, hierarchical system, or imparting of DNA to our folk. The three households/economic levels do not meet the Germanic hierarchical depiction or George Dumezil's warrior, priest, and producer explanation for Indo-Europeans. I would also argue that Odin, Villi, and Ve imparted their divine DNA to us in our creation/evolution. I don't think we need a booster shot in DNA to make us closer to the gods/goddesses. If we needed a booster shot of DNA, then why did it only happen to three households and why isn't it continually happening now? I would argue that the three households are different levels of our spiritual evolution and the birth of a child is either us reincarnating, or gaining an epiphany in our spiritual evolution in a single life. I would argue that Odin's visitation to the households is a spiritual visitation. I not only believe that Odin travels to Midgard to interact with his folk, but that he also interacts with his folk subconsciously on an individual basis and to our folk's collective unconsciousness to assist us in our spiritual evolution.

In the first household, the door was unclosed. The husband and wife were poor with meager accommodations and food. After entering the household, Rig gave them "counsel". The child that was begotten, was swarthy with a hideous countenance. His life was one of hard labor. I would argue that the household door being unclosed means that their unconscious mind or their interaction with the collective unconscious mind was open enough to allow them to receive "counsel" from Odin. The counsel from Odin was to help them spiritually evolve, to allow them to connect and come home to our gods/goddesses, ancestors, and wights. The description of hard labor describes someone that has no connection to the spiritual world but is only focused on the

spiritual connection, Odin "counsels" them to give them the spark of spiritual evolution. Whether that spark takes hold in this life or the next is the question, but I believe it will eventually manifest.

In the second household, the door was unclosed. The husband and wife were capable of crafting wood and clothing. After entering the household, Rig gave them "counsel". The child that was begat was rosy and ruddy with sparkling eyes. He was capable of building, creating, and producing. He and his wife shared their wealth, kept their household together, and lived joyously. In this household, we have the same openness to be counseled spiritually by Odin. The child in this household was spiritually higher, but he had not spiritually evolved. His understanding of the mundane was to a point that he could create and produce. He was in a position to start grasping his spiritual evolution. His "sparkling" eyes indicate that the spark that Odin had given him either in a past life or earlier in this life was starting to manifest.

In the third household, the gate was wide open, fastened to a post. The husband and wife were attractive and dressed in fine clothes. After entering the household, Rig gave them "counsel". The accommodations and the food were the best. They drank and reveled as the day went by. Earl was begotten and he had light locks, fair cheeks, and the "flashing [in] his eyes like a serpent's shone". Rig came to Earl and taught him the runes, gave him his name, claimed him as his own son, and bade him to "hold the ancestral fields and the ancient home." Earl went on to battle and won himself eighteen halls. Earl would share his wealth with his folk. Earl begat children, but only Kon, the youngest, would learn the runes, "runes eternal and runes of life." "Then he strove in runes with Rig, the Earl, crafty wiles he used and won, so gained his heritage, held the right thus Rig he be called and runes to know". The wide-open gate denotes the members of the household being "wide-open" to Odin's spiritual guidance. The husband and wife after being "counseled" begat Earl, a child that has spiritually evolved to a point to be able to use the runes. Earl begets Kon, who not only is able to use the runes like his father but is able to expound on their usage. Earl was spiritually evolved to the point that Odin adopted him, gave him his name, and instructed him to hold the ancestral fields and ancient home. I would argue that ancestral fields and ancient home is our ancestral faith. I would argue that Earl and Kon had spiritually evolved to the point that they are connected to the runes, the gods/goddesses, and the ancestors, and have gained their **heritage**. I believe that once we have gained our heritage, we have a responsibility to share our spiritual wealth and lead our folk home.

Odin has made many sacrifices in an effort to gain knowledge to protect and teach his folk. Odin has "counseled" us so that we can grow the divine spark that he gave us. The actions of Odin, are like the actions of a good father that loves his children and wants them to grow into good adults.

Beer Tavern Bread

Served for the Leadership Sumbel on August 12, 2022, for Njordshof Dedication.


The culmination of a couple of different recipes. I have yet to make it the same twice. Note: Single batch version can be doubled very easily. Can use a mixture of different flours (wheat and all-purpose).

Preheat oven to 375

- -Half a summer sausage, 1/2" cubed, frozen
- -Half block or more of preferred semi-soft cheese (cheddar or pepper jack work great.), 1/2" cubed, frozen
- -3 cups unbleached all-purpose flour (use the good stuff.)
- -4 teaspoons baking powder
- -1/3 cup sugar (honey also works very well.)
- -12 ounces beer (a strong IPA works great. The lighter the beer, the less impact it will have on flavor.)
- -1/2 cup melted butter

Mix flour, sugar, and baking powder. Add butter and beer (or reserve the butter and pour over top before baking). Adjust dough with more flour or beer if needed. Fold in frozen sausage and cheese. Place onto a greased baking dish (cast iron works great but

Congratulations to the newly oathed Folkbuilders: Jessie Shaffer, Sara Ault, and Jamie Alainn!








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Fort Worth Archery Moot
